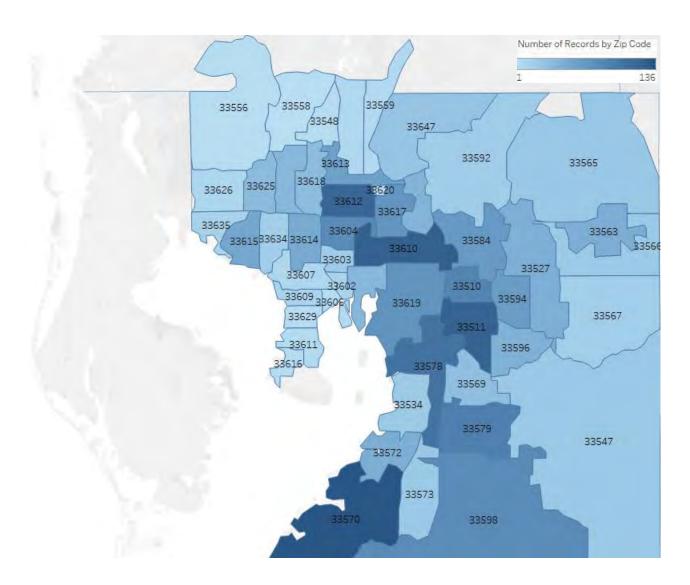

#### Approval of Re-Release of Request for Proposals for Level (2) Uniting Grant

**Initiator:** Maria Negrón, Director of Programs

**Action:** Approval of Release of Request for Proposals for Level (2) Uniting Grant

**Date:** Regular Board Meeting, Thursday, January 28, 2021

#### **Recommended Actions**

1. Recommend re-release in February 2021 of a Request for Proposals for a Level (2) Uniting Grant with a total allocation up to \$300,000 to address community needs of Hillsborough County children located in Palm River, Clair-Mel and surrounding neighborhoods through best practices in the areas of Children are Healthy and Safe, Children are Developmentally on Track, Children are Ready to Learn and Succeed, and/or Family Support.

#### **Background**

- The preliminary FY 2020-2021 budget includes new program funding for the following:
  - 1. A total of \$300,000 through a competitive Request for Proposals for a Uniting Grant to address community needs in Palm River, Clair-Mel and surrounding neighborhoods.
  - 2. The release was originally posted in August. The Children's Board received (3) submissions and a Community Review Team scored (1) proposal. However, there was no recommendation of funding.





#### **Approval to Obligate Emergency Funding**

**Initiator:** Maria Negrón, Director of Programs

**Action:** Approval to Obligate Emergency Funding

**Date:** Regular Board Meeting, Thursday, January 28, 2021

#### **Recommended Actions**

Recommend approval to obligate up to \$137,500 of Emergency Funding for a Path to Prevention program with Dawning Family Services from March 1, 2021 to September 30, 2021 to expand housing support services to Hillsborough County residents at risk of homelessness in response to COVID-19.

#### **Background**

- Dawning Family Services (formerly known as Alpha House) has been funded since 2007 and have become a critical source of support in our community to address the needs of homeless women and their children.
- They are currently funded to support families in emergency shelter to seek permanent housing. The agency employs staff who are content experts in navigating the local housing system.
- In an effort to respond to a growing threat, Dawning Family Services is proposing to expand and offer preventative case management services in our county to support families at risk of becoming homeless.
- The new program would employ Homeless Prevention Specialists that would also be trained to access Administrative Service Organization (ASO) funding.
- In addition, they intend to work with system partners such as the School District HELP Team that supports children in transition and the Tampa-Hillsborough Homeless Initiative.
- This request is for their startup year, upon Board approval, the annualized amount for FY 2022 would be \$275,000.

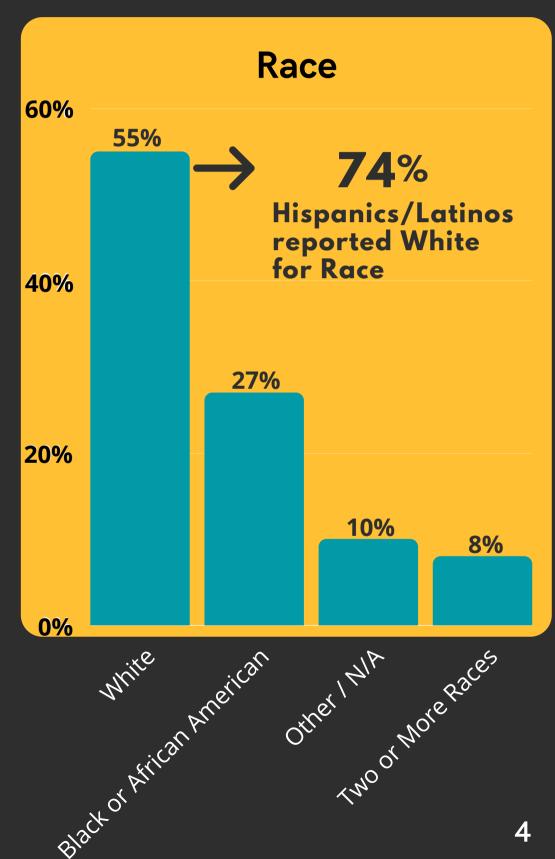

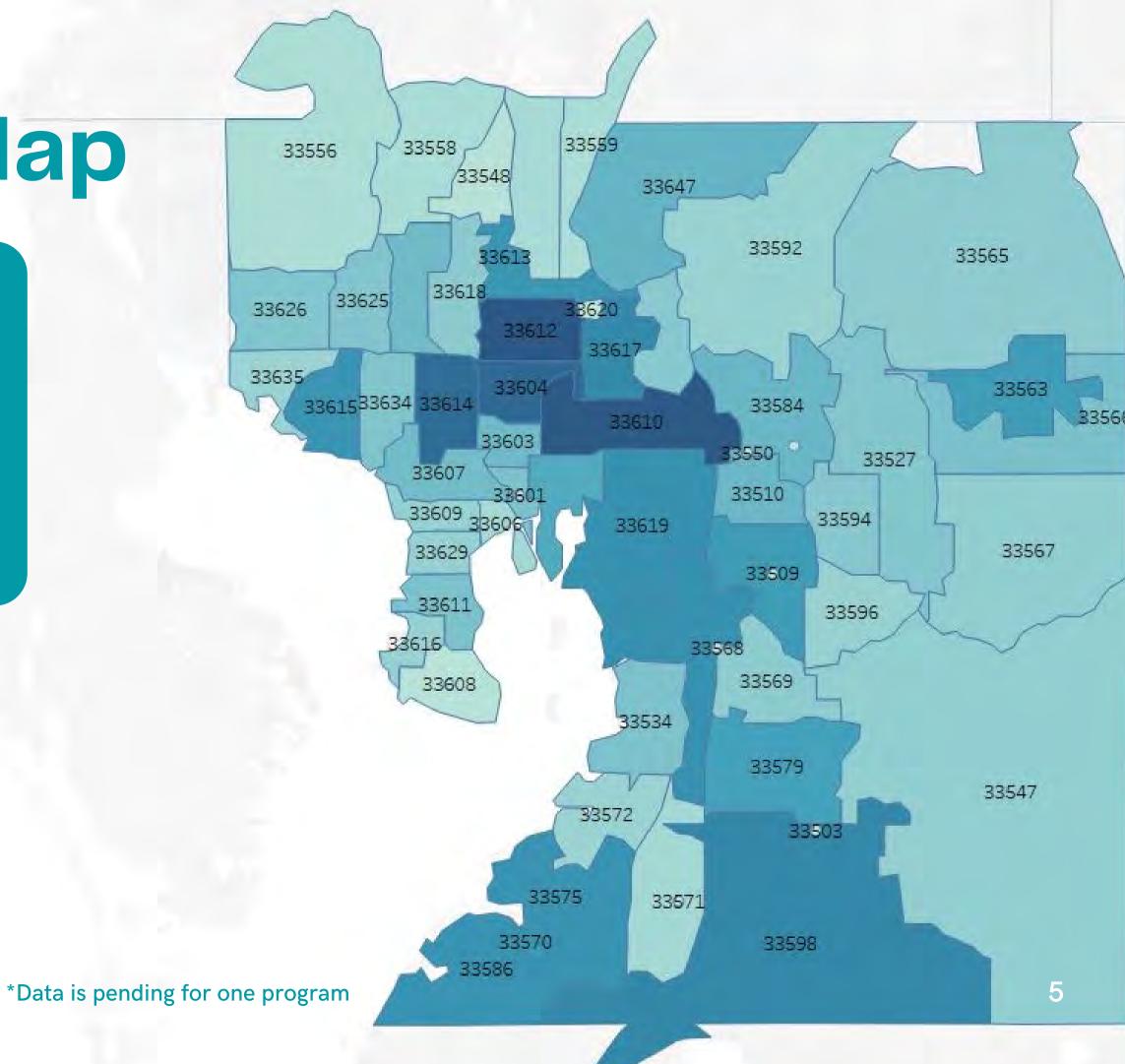


## Participant Map

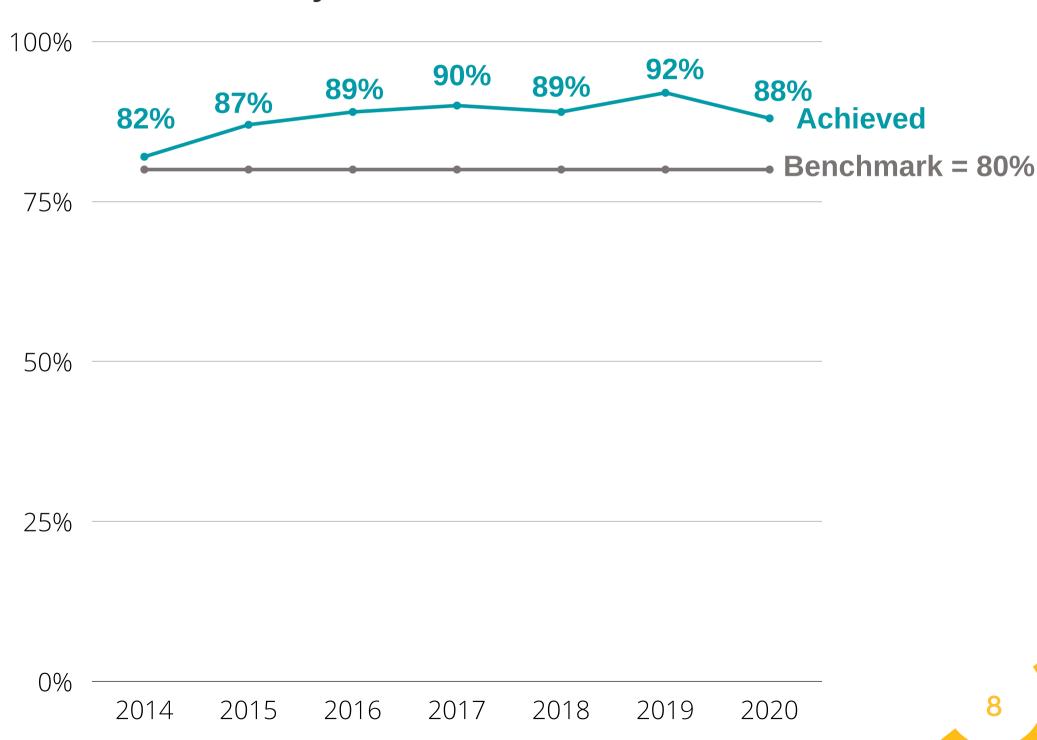

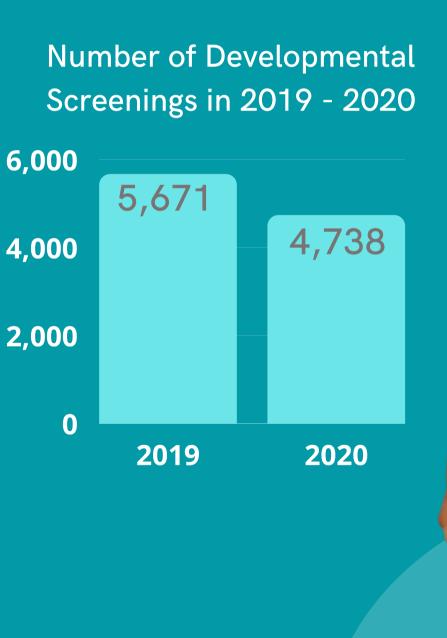

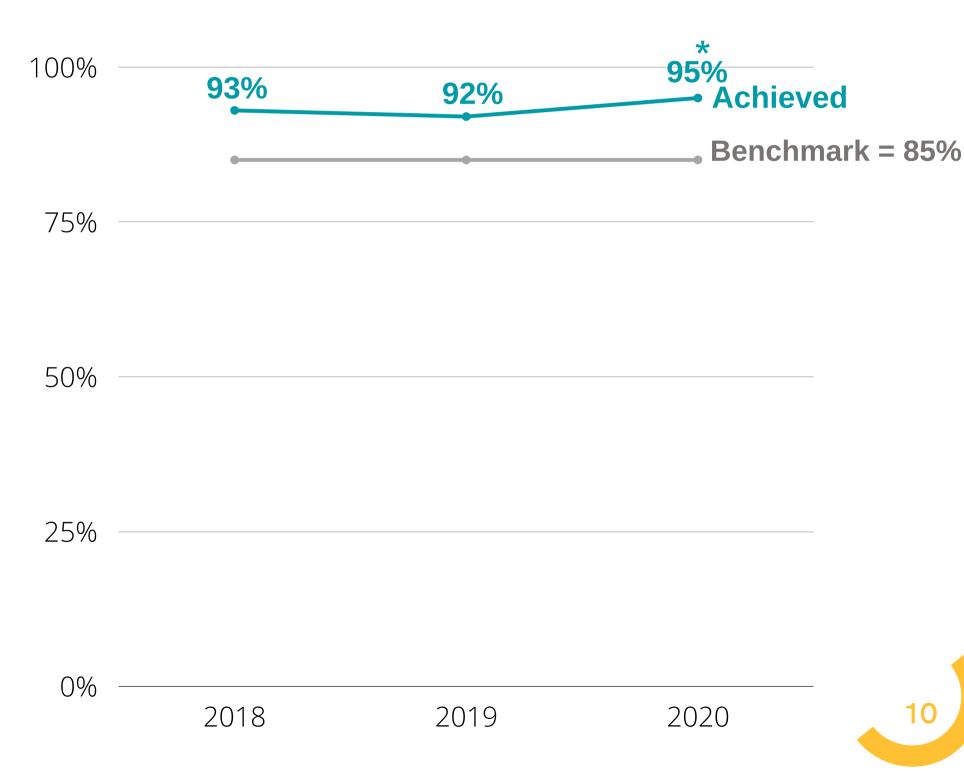

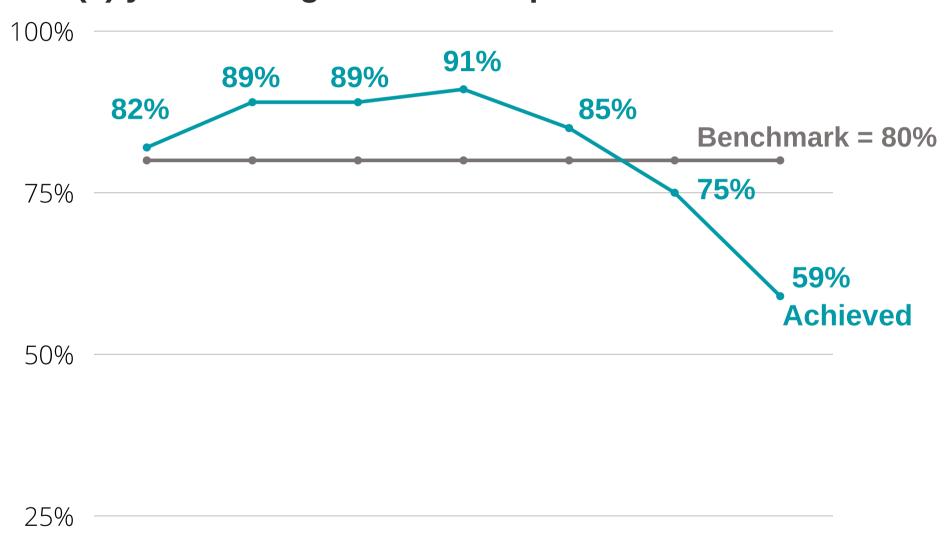

### FY19/20 Highlights

- Created and committed to a timeline for the FY 2020-2021 contract development process with the goal of having contracts prepared by October 1.
- Achievement: (54) of (60) contracts or (91%) were finalized, signed by Kelley and sent to the Providers by October.
- The pandemic changed us all. The CBHC as well as the provider community adapted to elevate contract monitoring and sustained continuous service delivery with families throughout the County in ways that have improved our practices. While access to technology is still a barrier, it has also opened doors as a way to serve more vulnerable populations. It has also created efficiencies in our work (i.e. reducing travel time); increased partnerships and collaboration; and has raised our awareness and need for resource sharing.

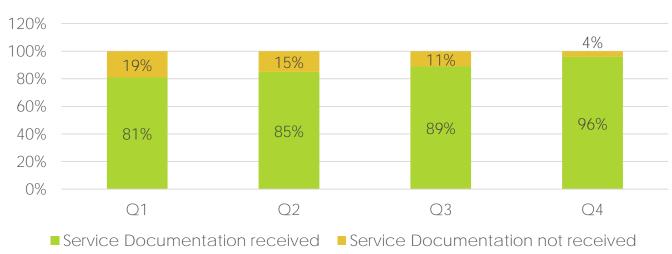

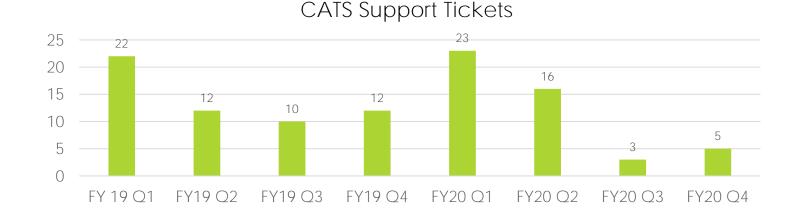

### 1. Center Location



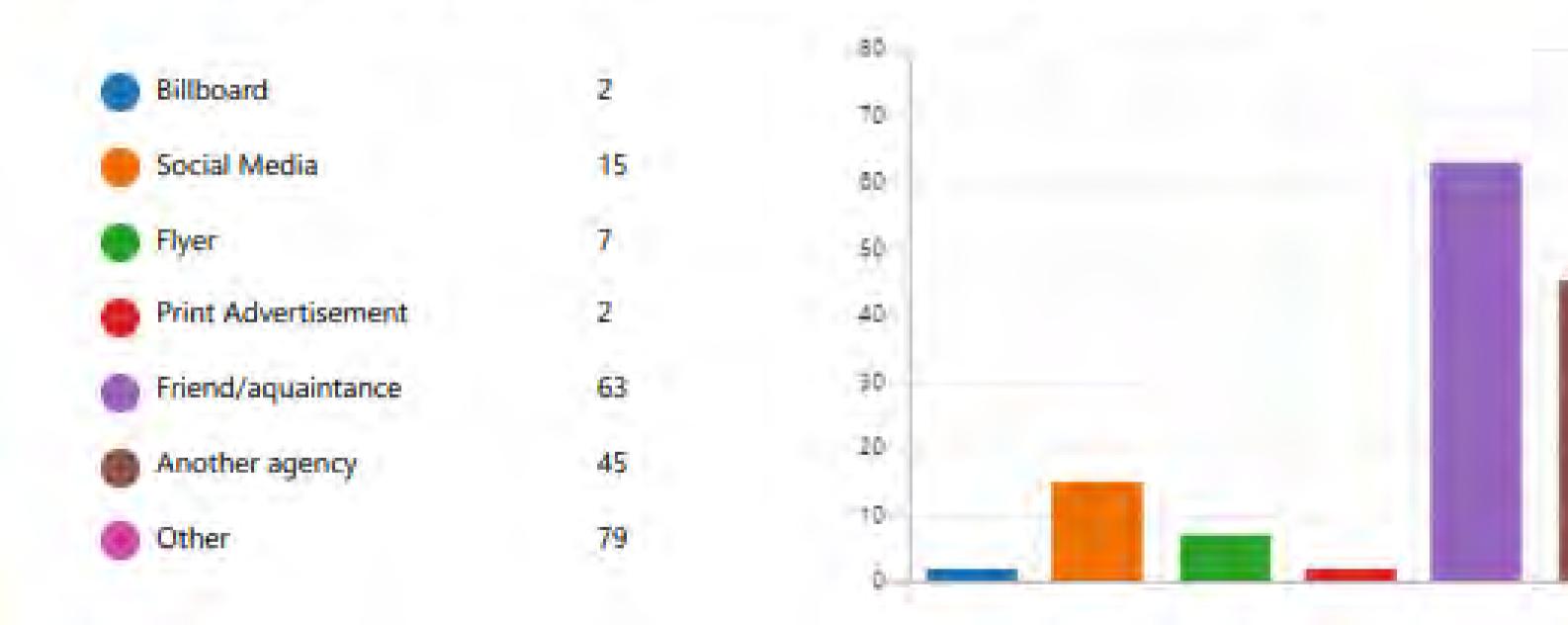

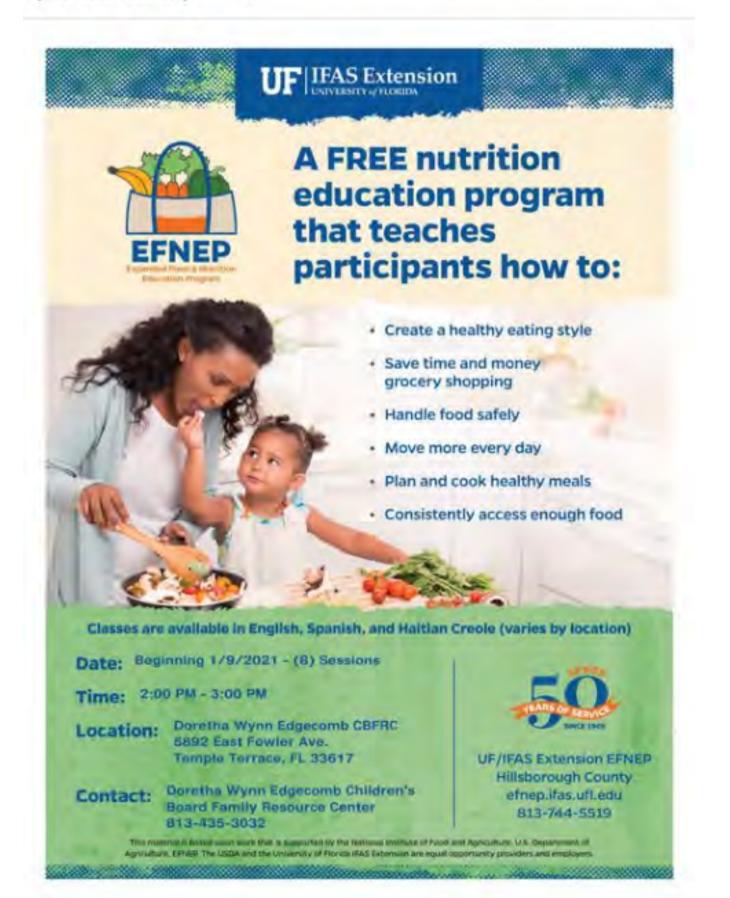

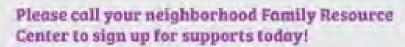

### IT ONLY TAKES A SECOND: The Importance of Water Safety for Kids with Autism Spectrum Disorder

"I only turned my back for a second." It's one of the most common things first responders hear from parents when they respond to drownings and near drown-

"We often underestimate how long it takes to perform some of the most mundane tasks," says Hillsborough Fire Rescue Quality Management Chief Jeremy it can take a child to drown. These two facts combined can lead to tragic results very quickly. Drowning is often a very qui-et event and not the loud, dramatic event often portrayed on television."

As of Nov. 10 this year, Fischler says Hillsborough County Fire Rescue responded to 18 pediatric drowning calls in 2020, five of which were fatal.

The number of children drowning in our community is devastating and concern-ing. Fischler says more should be done to educate families and caregivers about the importance of taking the extra steps to keep our children safe.

There is also great concern for children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD), who tend to be drawn to water.

"Experts are not sure why this fascination exists, but when you add that children with autism may also have difficulty recognizing and avoiding danger, the risk for drowning is very high," says Christine Rover, assistant program director of the Center for Autism & Related Disabilities

She tells us drowning is the leading cause of death for children with an autism spectrum disorder, and the first layer of protection is to introduce a child to swim lessons This is something families can take advantage of year-round.

Rover explains that CARD-USF assembles an annual list of swim lesson providers for the 14 counties they cover, and they encourage families to call or email the organization to learn about programs in their commun ty. In Hillsborough County, the Children's Board funds swim lessons for children with special needs who might benefit from

"A crowded pool with lots of activity and noise may be overwhelming, so taking a mall group lesson at a quieter time may be a good fit," Rover explains. "Instructors should provide specific information about what the child should do, provide simple steps, use concrete wording and follow a routine. CARD is available to provide free training to instructors so they can support learners with ASD."

In addition to swim lessons and diligent ly keeping an eye on our children in and near water, Fischler says we can all take steps to keep our children safe like installing perimeter warning devices on exterior doors, installing pool fences and utilizing water surface alarms. These devices will alert you if a child has gone somewhere

It is recommended that all adults take a CPR course. The American Heart Association, American Red Cross and American Safety and Health Institute all offer virtual classes. The Children's Board of Hillsborough County funds CPR classes at no cost at their Family Resource Centers.

"These precautions are no replacement for a high level of diligence when small says. "When children are near the water or playing in the water, there should AL-WAYS be an adult whose job it is to keep their eyes on the children. This is sometimes difficult to remember during social events with a lot of people, so it should be so there is no question whether someone is watching the children."

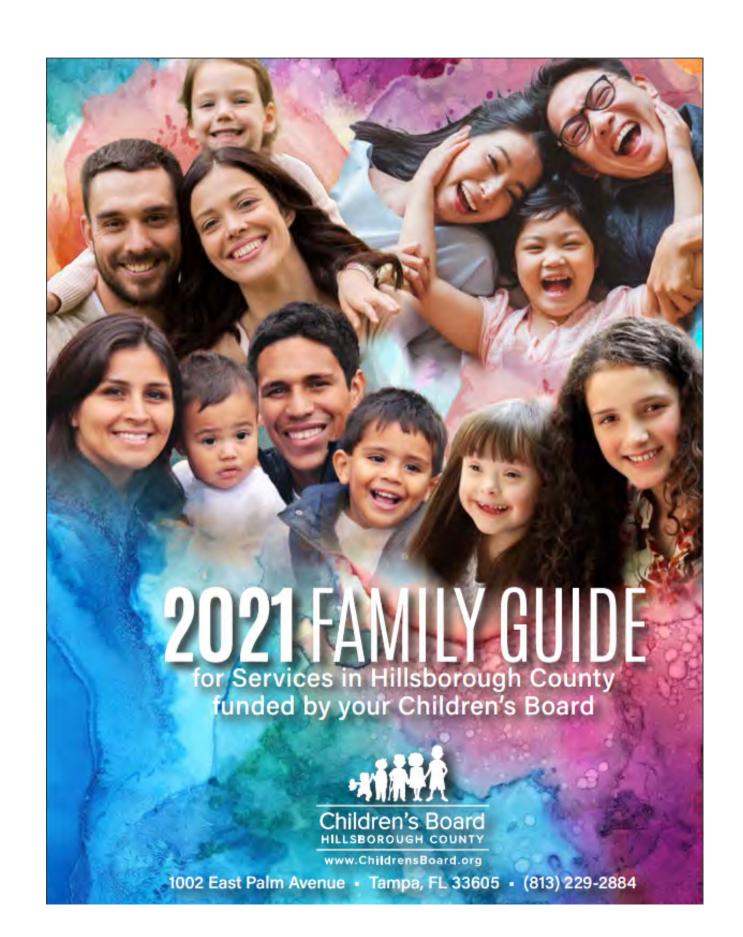

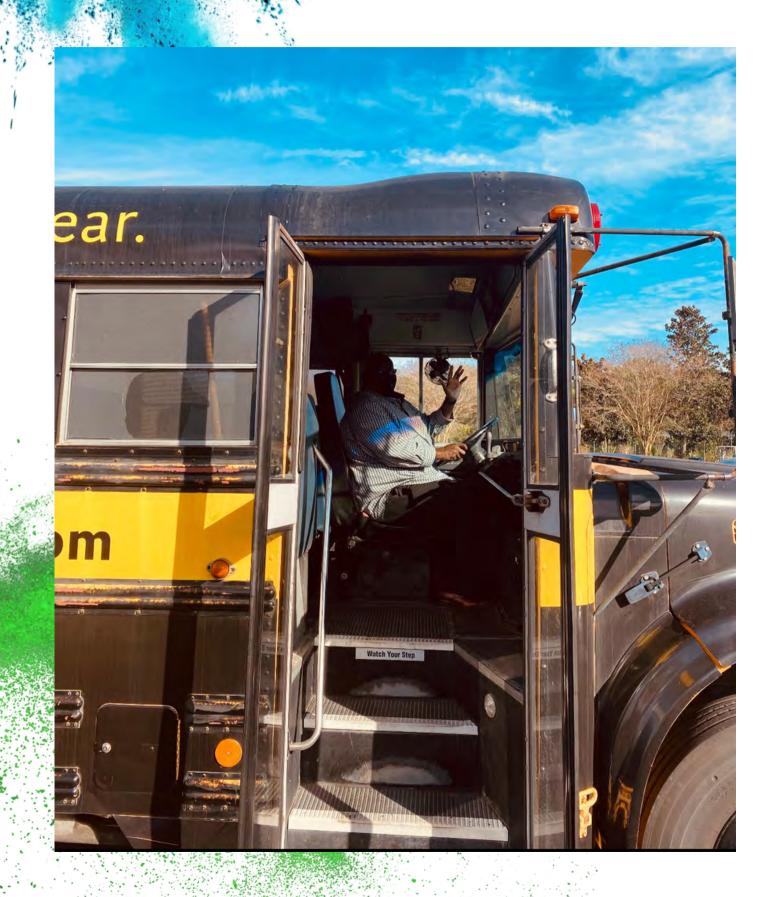

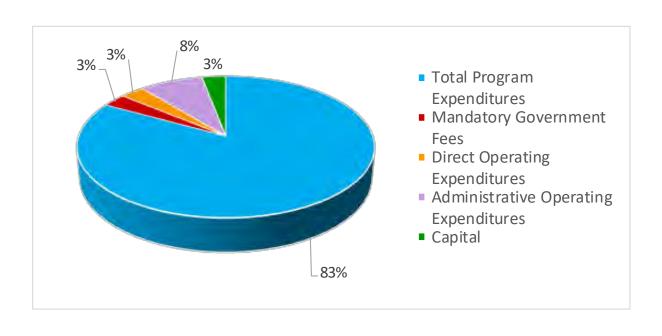

### Financial Statement Category Definitions

#### Revenue

- Ad-Valorem Taxes includes current and delinquent ad-valorem tax revenue and excess fees returned to the Children's Board originally paid to the county based on the tax revenue.
- **Investment Income** includes revenue from various interest-bearing accounts.
- Administrative Services Organization (ASO) funding represents contributions from other funders specifically designated for use by providers in the community managed by the Children's Board ASO staff. These dollars are also included in the program expenditure line. Examples are Eckerd Connects and Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC).
- Other Community Partner funding represents funds contributed from community partners
  that are added to our provider contract amounts and included in the program funding line,
  for example, the School District of Hillsborough County and Hillsborough County BOCC.
- Miscellaneous Income consists of ASO fiscal agent fees, contributions, and any other miscellaneous revenue received during the year.

### Expenditures

- Program Funding (Continuation Grants) represents provider contracts funded by Children's Board, property tax revenue and funds contributed from our community partners. This amount also includes the dollars managed through the ASO to provide supports to case management programs.
- New Program Funding (unallocated) includes dollars budgeted for new program contracts and one-time funding that will be released and awarded by a competitive or application process.
- Employee Salaries and Benefits include wages paid to all non-contractor employees.
   Benefits represent costs provided for salaried and hourly wage employees including FICA, life and health insurance, short-term and long-term disability insurance, unemployment, and retirement benefits.
- Contracted Professional Services represents amounts budgeted for Hillsborough County information technology services, Hillsborough County Television, legal, media buys, auditing, and other professional services.
- Facility Expenditures represents necessary costs to operate the Children's Board offices, conference center, and Family Resource Center buildings owned by CBHC, including utilities, information technology, maintenance, and repairs.
- Other Operating contains staff training, conference and meeting travel, postage, insurance, promotional activities, printing, supplies, advertising for Truth In Millage (TRIM), budget ads and other public notices, memberships and subscriptions. Also included are support activities with provider agencies and community organizations for training events.
- Capital Expenditures include the budget for building expenditures.

The Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning (CASEL) defines SEL as "How children and adults learn to understand and manage emotions, set goals, show empathy for others, establish positive relationships and make responsible decisions." Good Afternoon Friends and Amigos Afterschool Program recognizes that Social and Emotional Learning is essential in determining how well equipped students will be in meeting the demands of the classroom especially during COVID-19. Using a research-based curriculum called Second Step, that promotes social-emotional development, safety and wellbeing for children and families in addition to academic support, daily mindfulness activities, weekly yoga sessions and family engagement events where we create a holistic and unique approach to learning.

At Reddick Elementary School in Wimauma, Ms. Lisandra collaborated with the Dual Language Teachers Ms. Rivera, Ms. Guadalupe and Mr. Yang for a Hispanic Heritage celebration and performance that was LOTS OF FUN! At Good Afternoon Friends and Amigos, students learn positive skills for learning, living and loving such as empathy, compassion, and self-confidence through daily social emotional learning lessons Monday through Thursday at two Hillsborough County elementary schools. ### **Lawyers Helping Kids**

### 07/24/20

Client DF applied for our services when a default was entered against her in an eviction action. DF believed that the default was entered incorrectly, and that the eviction was without merit. DF was particularly concerned about an eviction because she is a Section 8 participant. If the eviction stood, DF would almost surely lose her Section 8 assistance. DF relies on the assistance to care for her two minor children. The situation was even more critical because DF recently took legal custody of a niece, and she hoped that that plan to provide much needed stability for that child would not be undermined. Dan Reigle of Team ABLE agreed to assist DF under the Lawyers Helping Kids Program funded by the Children's Board of Hillsborough County. Dan immediately went to work on the legal arguments to get the default set aside. The situation was such that a hearing on a Motion to Set Aside the Default would at least be considered by the court, but the facts were such that a judge could have reasonably ruled either way. Dan also contacted the attorney for the landlord, with a proposed settlement. After several proposals and counter-proposals an agreement was reached. DF agreed to pay a modest amount toward costs and attorney's fees in the matter by the end of July. Fortunately the landlord also agreed to dismiss the matter immediately. Often landlord's will not agree to actually dismiss the case until all payments are made. DF's viability for Section 8 assistance was thus preserved.

Our client, Mr. J, shares the same father with his now two-year-old twin sisters. The twins were born in Georgia in 2018 to a mother who has long term substance abuse issues. The girls were placed with the father by a Georgia court in November of 2018, when they were 7 months old. The father proceeded to drop the children off to our client, his adult son, in Tampa. Our client sought Bay Area's services in order to gain legal custody of the children so that he and his partner could arrange for needed services for the twins who were born premature, substance exposed and had respiratory issues. Thanks to the Children's Board funding with the Lawyers Helping Kids grant, Laura Ankenbruck (Family Law Team), was able to file for temporary legal custody to extended family for the client. After many phone calls and the help of the Hillsborough County Judge, we were able to obtain birth certificates for the children, verify that the court in Georgia no longer had jurisdiction and obtain legal custody for our client. The photo of the caregivers (client and his girlfriend) was taken when they were honored at a Kinship event for the loving care they provide to the girls.

# The Crisis Center of Tampa Bay

### **Gateway Services**

A family who called in to 2-1-1 looking for financial assistance was linked with the Child Development Infoline Team due to their being a two-year-old child in the home. Upon contacting the mother, she informed the Care Coordinator that she was having some developmental concerns with her child. After completing the Ages and Stages Questionnaire, the child needed services through Bay Area Early Steps. Once the child was referred to Early Steps, the care coordinator was able to take an in depth look at what the immediate needs of the family were. The family needed many items, but the mother stated the most crucial were food, educational activities, and payment assistance with daycare. The team was able to provide many of the supports the family so desperately needed. The mother noted that she was extremely grateful for all the help provided. Upon closing the case, the family was connected to multiple different concrete supports including, Educational Activities from the Children's Board Family Resource Center Website, WIC Benefits, Arts and Craft supplies that were provided by the Crisis Center of Tampa Bay to help the child build more fine motor skills, and financial assistance with daycare so that she could go back to work full-time which was taken care of by the "United Way" COVID-19 relief funding. After closing the case, the Mother sent the Care Coordinator a text stating, "You have been the best. My child is going to hear all about you and how you cared for us during a tough time. I will never forget you. Thank you again and stay safe and healthy. Missing you already. Take care".

The impact that this program has on families can last much longer than the amount of time they receive our services. We are so grateful to have the opportunity to work with families in need and have the support of many local agencies throughout our community.

### **Community Collaborations for Strong Families (CCSF)**

The Community Collaborations for Strong Families (CCSF) program collaborated with G3 Life Applications and Lutheran Services Florida Early Head Start to deliver gifts to children and families in the community. Families were invited to the Dream Center of Tampa Bay (operated by Grace Family Church) to pick out gifts for children birth to fourteen years old. Upon arrival families were greeted by staff volunteers, taken through the gift sorting line, and given a photo op with Santa!

To start, the Tampa Y's Veggie Van generously donated more than 70 bags of fresh fruits and vegetables to all kids in the program. 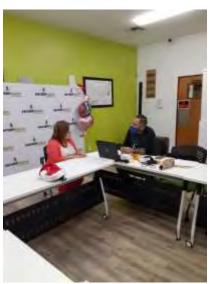

# Success 4 Kids and Families & Enterprising Latinas



Prior to COVID-19, Success 4 Kids and Families(S4KF) along with Enterprising Latinas had been diligently working on a collaborative project that would provide a community-based Spanish speaking Nurturing Parenting group for mothers in the Wimauma and Ruskin areas. As everyone knows COVID-19 had a major impact regarding how agencies such as ours, could continue to provide quality services to families and participants; to be more specific, the challenge was how were we going to continue working with participants when we have been accustomed to seeing them face to face. Now we can no longer see participants(temporarily) face to face, much less be in the same room. With the GREAT Teamwork amongst both agencies, persistence, and dedication, it was agreed that the

show must go on. The solution was to offer the same exact curriculum S4KF would normally provide in a classroom setting except let us do it virtually and utilize one of the virtual platforms that many providers and families are more familiar with such as Microsoft Teams or Zoom. After many hours of planning and several months of discussions, our very first Virtual Nurturing Parenting Group would come to fruition on October 27,2020. Enterprising Latinas was able to register a total of thirteen mothers to participate in our virtual Nurturing Parenting group lessons which would be offered once per week. The final virtual lesson was held on 12/1/2020 and a total of eight mothers successfully completed the Nurturing Parenting Curriculum and were awarded their certificates of completion. The feedback from the community was that this group was great, and the participants even said that they wish the lessons could continue because they did not want

the lessons to end. Because of feedback such as the above mentioned, S4KF looks forward to continued partnerships so that we can continue to promote all the amazing services available. ### **Preserve Vision Florida**

### Children's Vision Health and Safety Services
