

Negron provided an update on the data compiled from the 2021 Summer Programs: Three hundred thirty-eight (338) children were served with Summer Services, not including those participating in the Summer Passports Program; Eighty-eight percent (88%) of the children remained enrolled in the summer program; Eighty-four percent (84%) were eligible for free or reduced lunch; A. Mayts inquired about the potential for wrap around services to provide food security on the weekends to program participants.

Recommended Actions

Recommend release in January 2022 of a Request for Proposals for time-limited 2022 Summer Services Grant funding with a total allocation up to \$245,000 to increase youth access to high quality summer programming.

Background

- The Children's Board has released summer services grants since 2015.
- As a result, 4,870 youth have received services provided by these grants.
- The 2021 Summer Services Report was included in the October 2021 Board Book.
- The Board of County Commissioners have renewed their collaboration with the Children's Board and will contribute \$250,000 so that (9) 2021 Summer Services contracts may be renewed for 2022.
- The Children's Board will serve as the managing entity for all grants awarded.
- The intent is to offer multiple leading grants to enhance existing summer programs (excluding those being renewed) as well as new programs.
- The (9) Summer Services contract renewals are not eligible to apply.
- All 2022 Summer Services Grants awarded will not be subject to renewal in FY 2023.

Recommended Actions

Approve up to \$125,000 in Emerging Needs Funding to support an FTE Coordinator for the Community Alliance of Hillsborough County.

Background

On or about November 4, 2021 Eckerd Connects notified the Department of Children and Families it would terminate their Community Based Care, "Lead Agency" contract in Hillsborough County upon expiration; July 1, 2022.

Eckerd Connects is contracted to provide Foster Care and "Related Services" including but not limited to: child abuse prevention and protection, adoptions, family preservation, independent living, emergency shelter, residential group care, therapeutic foster care, intensive residential treatment, foster care supervision, case management, coordination of mental health services, post-placement supervision, permanent foster care, and family reunification.

The Community Alliance, which the Children's Board is a Statutory Member, is charged with community planning and oversight for the Community Based Care "Lead Agency". The FTE Coordinator of the Community Alliance will support the membership in the planning and execution of the Community Alliance's statutory obligations. Mary Lee's House will serve as the fiscal agent and the FTE will be housed at Mary Lee's House.

"Mary Lee's House is a community collaboration committed to protecting, respecting, and healing the children of abuse and neglect who pass through our doors."





Fall has been full of fun opportunities for students to spend time with friends, celebrate our families and learn about our collective culture.

Some key concepts in our Social Emotional and mindfulness lessons this Fall have been Community, Compassion, and Self Confidence and Self Care breathing exercises.

Children at Good Afternoon Friends and Amigos participate in Mindfulness activities daily, children are taught techniques like butterfly and five finger breathing that teach children how to pause and use their fingers to take five deep breaths tracing, each finger up and down moving in sequence as they breathe in and out.

Some other strategies we have been using this year to help support our students social and emotional learning are caring for our environment and extending learning outside of the classroom creating a small butterfly garden at one of our host schools Robinson Elementary in Plant City.

Spending time in nature can help students manage their emotions and connect meaningfully with the world around them. Engaging with their senses and opportunities for exploration, providing students with practical opportunities to understand their role and impact in their community and the outside world.

At both Good Afternoon Friends and Amigos sites our Social and Emotional Learning library corners have become spaces where children can cozy up with friends and read together or just take a few moments for themselves to rest and self-regulate. Children are also given books to take home and create their own SEL libraries to reinforce and share what they are learning with their families.

Hispanic Heritage month was a great opportunity for our students to build their cultural awareness and self-confidence. We have read stories about Cesar Chavez, Frida Kahlo, Celia Cruz and have many books in our libraries written by Hispanic authors like Gabbi Garcia who wrote, Escuchando a Mi Cuerpo and Listening with my Heart. On Fun Friday children wore cultural clothing and played Loteria!

Positive Spin

Empowering a Community with Hope (E.A.C.H. One)



Hello, my name is Kendra Singleton and I am a single mother of three children. I first heard about Positive Spin when my apartment complex was having an Outreach Event in our community. I stopped by the Positive Spin table and I met a nice lady named Priscilla Perez. She talked to me about the program and she had me fill out a form and told me they would call me the next day. I didn't believe her, but she did call the very next day.

The same week Ms. Priscilla began working with me. First, she visited my home and we talked about what I needed and how I can grow. The following week, I took my first online class about

housing rights. It was very informational because a lot of the topics discussed were new to me. The next class I took was my favorite because it was a financial class and I really needed that. Ms. Nyela Hope, who runs the class even switched the day of the class so I could attend on my day off from work. I learned so much about budgeting, credit and debit cards and even the envelope system. She took her time with me to write out my money goals and things I should pay off first. She even showed me this budgeting envelope folder that I purchased off Amazon to help me get my goals in order. Positive Spin has helped me get clothes for my children and also helped me purchase household items we needed. In addition, they helped me get counseling and tutoring for my children. I have only been in the program a few months and it has already helped me tremendously. I am so very grateful for all they have done for me and my children.



Positive Spin

Empowering a Community with Hope (E.A.C.H. One)

C. Wilson came into the Positive Spin's program seeking housing, employment, C.N.A training and childcare assistance. While in the program, Ms. Wilson participated and completed the Financial Literacy and Housing Stability classes. Ms. Wilson and her five children were living with her mother and disabled brother in a two bed room apartment. Positive Spin's Case Manager, Ms. Sabrina Taylor, referred the client to 811 Mainstream and the client applied and was granted a housing voucher where she was able to move into a four bedroom house, despite having five evictions. Ms. Wilson had two young daughters who were not in pre-school and she needed all of her children to be in school which would allow her the freedom to work or go back to school. Ms. Taylor referred the client to Head Start. The client applied for Head Start and Early Head Start for her two young daughters and was able to get them enrolled. Ms. Wilson asked her Case Manager to assist her in finding out why she never received her child support, during the last four months. Ms. Taylor gathered the necessary information and contacted the Child Support office on behalf of her client. The Child Support representative stated they would have to research the matter and would get back in touch with them. Within a week's time, Ms. Wilson was informed that she had received a deposit of \$20,421.87 in back child support. Ms. Wilson was so happy about the great news and was very thankful for Ms. Taylor's help along with the support of Positive Spin.



Rebuilding Together Tampa Bay

Safe and Healthy Homes for Families



Over the past year, Rebuilding Together Tampa Bay's Safe and Healthy Homes program, funded by the Children's Board of Hillsborough County, has provided 80 families with critical home repairs to reduce asthma and allergy symptoms for children, and create a safer home for the family. Rebuilding Together's six-step process assesses families health and safety, provides key homes repairs, and engages families through an educational curriculum to help them stay safe and healthy well into the future.

With funding provided by the Children's Board, we have provided families with impactful repairs such as HVAC air duct cleanings, stairway railing repairs, plumbing leak repairs and minor mold remediation.

RTTB has been able to go the extra mile for some families. Although all get quality service and attention; on occasion, we notice that a home is in severe disrepair, causing serious health and safety concerns. Last grant year we met the A* family * (redacted for privacy concerns) when they joined our Safe and Healthy Homes program. The A's have five children and came to Florida for a better life for their children. They worked extremely hard to realize the American Dream and purchased a home. Although extremely modest, it quickly became apparent that they had fallen on hard times, after a predatory organization took advantage of them and cost them their life savings, H (the family patriarch) then started experiencing severe health issues, rendering him unable to work. These issues compounded and they lost their ability to make even the most basic repairs to their home. The situation was dire, they did not have a kitchen, their bathroom was filled with mold due to no ventilation, and their electric bill was exorbitant ranging from \$400 to \$500 dollars per month.

Safe and Healthy Homes for Families

RTTB called on our network because we had to do something for this family. Ultimately, Rebuilding Together was able to serve the A's through our Safe and Healthy Homes program and provide additional services through the resources of generous volunteers and partners. In addition to our evidence-based Safe and Healthy Home package, pest control and minor mold remediation, RTTB is providing the following services:

- Demo'd bathroom (which was filled with mold) and replaced with a new complete remodel
- Demo'd a wall in the home to create a kitchen in the home, the home in its previous state had NO inside kitchen
- Provide a roof replacement
- Installed a new sliding glass door where before they had wood planks separating the family from the elements (see pictures below)
- Paint exterior of the home
- Electrical upgrade to panel and old wiring
- Plumbing for kitchen & bath
- Three new ac units (window style)
- Paint interior

After completing the Safe and Healthy Homes program, the A's will be able to live well for years to come in their family home, providing space for learning, play, and family time, in a safe and allergy-free environment.

I am forever grateful to everyone who helped Gianna and thank the SEEDS Program for giving my girl that individualized attention that she needed to show growth.

Angel came into the North Tampa Family Resource Center looking for help with rental assistance.


