#### **Recommended Actions**

Recommend release in May 2024 of a Request for Proposals for one Fiscal Year 2025 Leading Grant to provide access to educational exhibit space and interactive services for children and their families at the Plant City Children's Board Family Resource Center (CBFRC) with a total allocation up to \$125,000.

#### **Background**

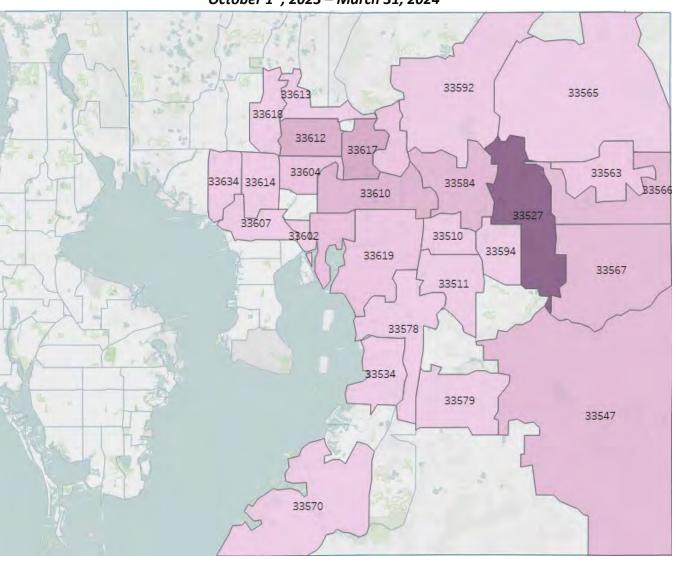
- The space in Plant City CBFRC is currently occupied with an exhibit from Glazer Children's Museum.
- The contract with Glazer Children's Museum was anticipated to continue through September 2026, however the Provider notified CBHC of their intention to end the contract as of September 30, 2024.
- CBHC met with the Plant City CBFRC Advisory Council as well as administered a participant survey to obtain feedback about the future use of the space.
  - o Overall the responses supported a family-friendly, interactive space.
- Results from the survey will be utilized in the funding release document.
- Funding for FY 2024-2025 is contingent upon Board approval of the budget at the Final TRIM Hearing.
- Contract anticipated start date is October 1, 2024.

# Pathways to Hope Program Services

Services use a "strengths-based" approach, tailored to the family with the goal to assist each family to reach or maintain housing stability.

Family Resource Specialists at each school offer system navigation support and connection to resources.

Each Family Resource Specialist will support 40 families per school on an ongoing basis, providing at least 820 concrete supports per year.

Employment/Vocational Specialists and Housing Specialists provide targeted support.

Services address 3 areas impacting families at-risk of homelessness:

Safe and Stable Income Housing Well-Being

- Employment search, resume writing, job interviewing and skills development
- Payment of expenses
- Bus Passes
- Case Planning

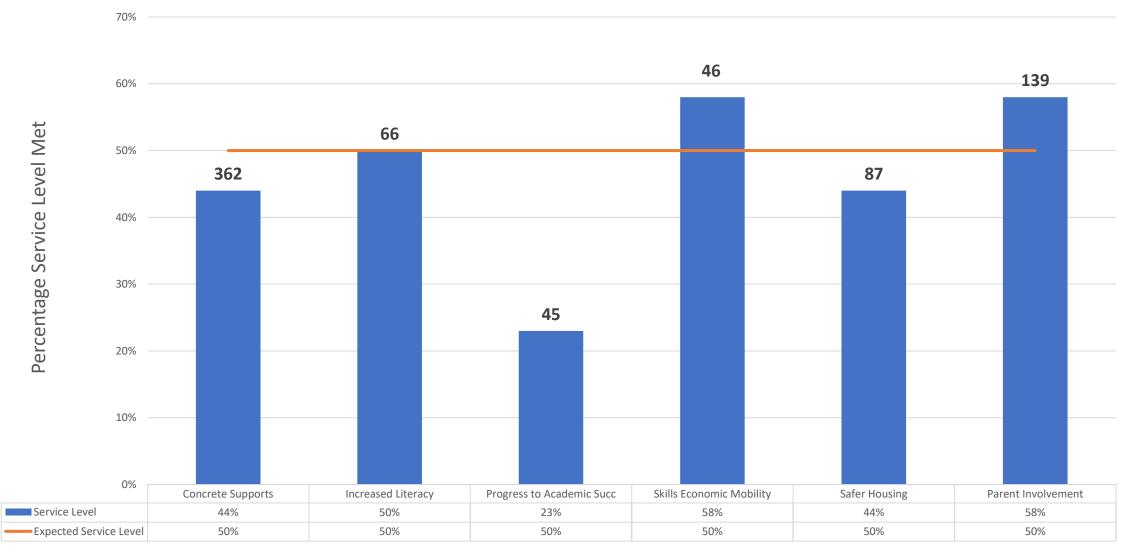

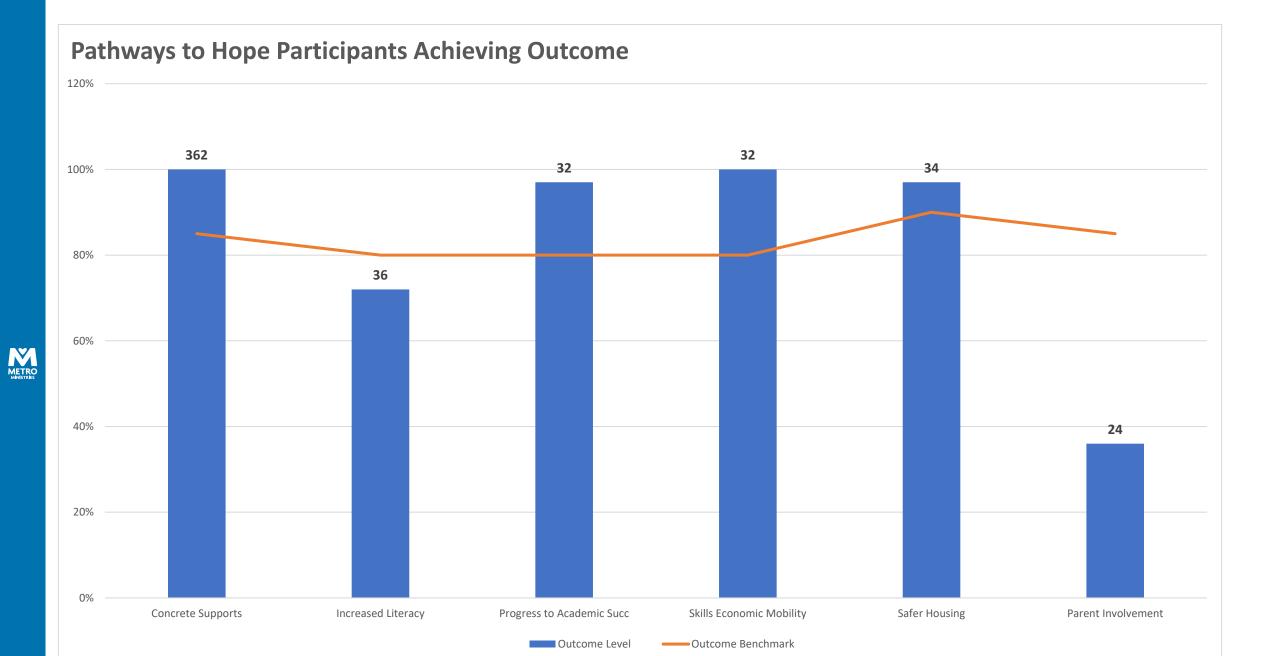

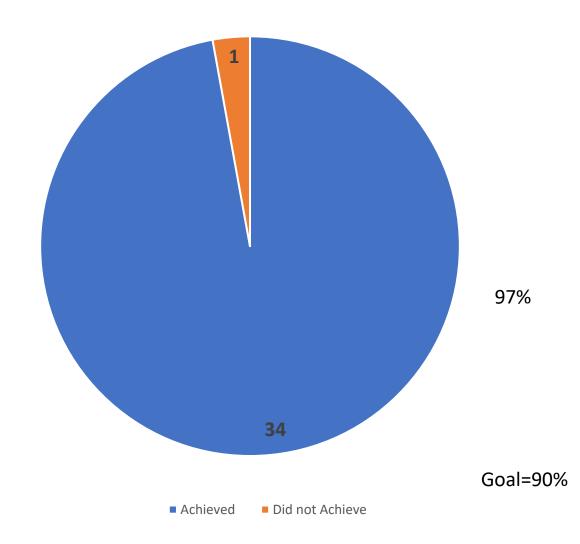
## Increased Literacy

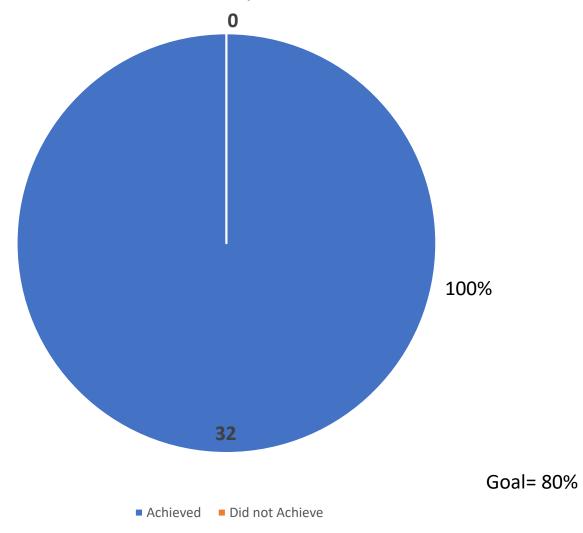

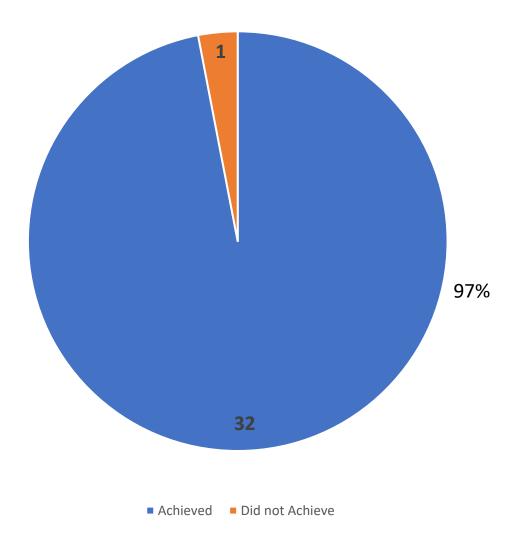




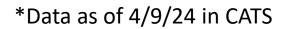

## Progress to Academic Success

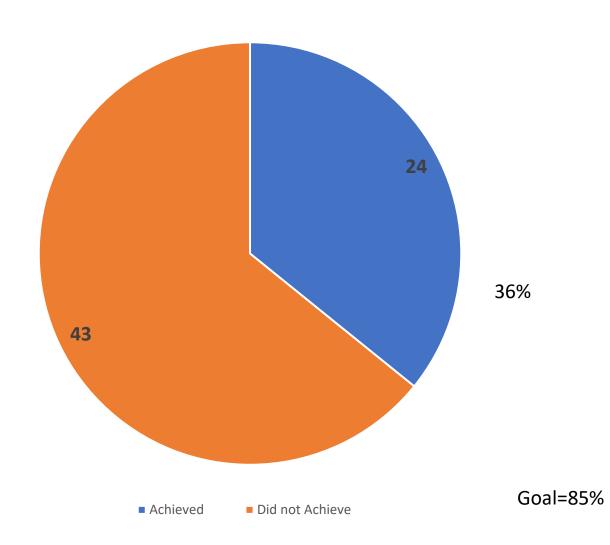

## STRENGTHENING FAMILIES:

The Role of Community Collaboration to Prevent Child Abuse

I began my career just over eight years ago as a child welfare case manager, hoping to reunite families that had been separated due to concerns of abuse and neglect. During that time of moving through various roles within the child welfare system, the same theme would re-appear. I began thinking, "What if the families had everything and everyone they needed in their backyard when a family crisis arose?" This is when I began to pay more attention to the concept of community-based care.

## WHAT IS COMMUNITY-BASED CARE?

Community-based care refers to the availability of supports and services within the community itself, rather than in more formal settings such as the child welfare system. It emphasizes the importance of shaping resources to meet the unique needs of individuals and families while leveraging existing community strengths.

Community-based care is not just about keeping families together; it's also about creating stronger, more resilient communities. When families receive the support they need to overcome challenges, children are more likely to succeed in school, stay out of trouble and grow into healthy, productive adults.

## THE POWER OF COMMUNITY COLLABORATION

A few years ago, I was introduced to an initiative that embodies the spirit of prevention and the power of community collaboration: the Hillsborough County Community Alliance. The Community Alliance is the voice of unique and vibrant partners throughout Hillsborough County. The Alliance has members that are required by statute; however, it is also comprised of multiple organizations seeking to address the needs of the children and families here in Hillsborough County.

The Community Alliance is responsible for bringing together key stakeholders, local agencies and community members that are dedicated to preventing child abuse and reducing the need for family separation. By addressing the root causes of family instability and fostering firmer community collaboration, the Community Alliance strives to keep families together and ensure that children can grow up in safe and loving homes.



One of the key principles driving the work of the Alliance is the recognition that no single organization or entity can address the complex needs of families in crisis alone. Instead, it takes a coordinated and holistic approach, with each partner contributing their unique expertise and resources. Whether it's providing access to affordable housing, offering parenting classes or connecting families with mental health services, every effort counts in helping families overcome obstacles and thrive.

## Programs focused on prevention

Getting parents to bond with their babies is one reason the organization offers breastfeeding support at more than 10 locations in Hillsborough and three in Pinellas, says Daniels. Parents can also bring their children to the service centers for developmental playgroups that allow them to socialize with other children and help prepare them for preschool and kindergarten.



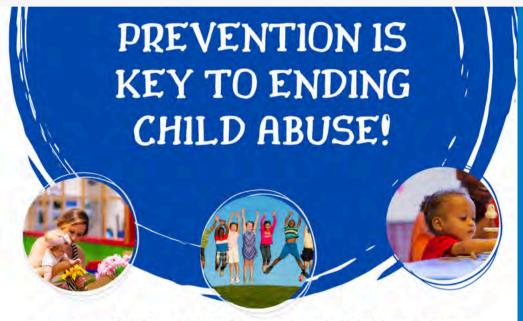

When they moved to Tampa, they sought out speech therapy programs in order to "play catch-up," she says, and they were eventually referred to the Easterseals program. Negron has been working with Davish, Simmons says, "and it has been going tremendously well."

Siffermann says a lot of times it comes down to modeling and repetition. Parents just may not know what techniques are needed to help their child. The program requires that parents be present when the specialist is working with the child so that they can learn the skills and work with the child when the specialist isn't there.

"They know that their child may not be able to articulate quite yet and speak on the level that they're supposed to be speaking at, but they don't know how to get from point A to point B," she says. "What would that in-between step look like? And that's where our specialist will come and they baby-step... everything out to help the parent."

#### Creating a plan for each child

The program screens every child, reviews screenings of the child from other programs, interviews the parents and uses parent questionnaires to create a support plan for the child,

#### Financial Statement Category Definitions

#### Revenue

- Ad-Valorem Taxes includes current and delinquent ad-valorem tax revenue and excess fees returned to the Children's Board originally paid to the County based on the tax revenue.
- Investment Income includes revenue from various interest-bearing accounts.
- Administrative Services Organization (ASO) funding represents contributions from other funders specifically designated for use by providers in the community, managed by the Children's Board ASO staff. These dollars are also included in the program expenditure line. An example is the Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC).
- Other Community Partner funding represents funds contributed from community partners
  that are added to our provider contract amounts and included in the program funding line,
  for example, the School District of Hillsborough County and Hillsborough County BOCC.
- **Miscellaneous Income** consists of match revenue from the insurance company, cash back from the credit card, and any other miscellaneous revenue received during the year.

#### Expenditures

- Program Funding (Continuation Grants) represents provider contracts funded by Children's Board, property tax revenue and funds contributed from our community partners. This amount also includes the dollars managed through the ASO to provide support to participants of case management programs.
- New Program Funding (unallocated) includes dollars budgeted for new program contracts and one-time funding that will be released and awarded by a competitive or application process.
- Employee Salaries and Benefits include wages paid to all non-contractor employees.

  Benefits represent costs provided for salaried and hourly wage employees including Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA), life and health insurance, short-term and long-term disability insurance, unemployment, and retirement benefits.
- Contracted Professional Services represents amounts budgeted for contracted information technology services, legal, media buys, auditing, and other professional services.
- **Facility Expenditures** represents necessary costs to operate the Children's Board offices, conference center, and seven (7) CBHC Family Resource Centers (CB FRC) occupancy expenditures, including utilities, information technology, maintenance, and repairs.
- Other Operating contains staff training, conference and meeting travel, postage, insurance, promotional activities, printing, supplies, advertising for Truth In Millage (TRIM), budget ads and other public notices, memberships, and subscriptions. Also included are support activities with provider agencies and community organizations for training and events.
- Capital Expenditures include the budget for building expenditures.
- Mandatory Government Fees include Tax Collector's fee, Property Appraiser's fee as well
  as the City Storm Water fee.

 This line is over the YTD budget by \$1,681,905; 94% of the tax revenue budgeted has been received to date.

#### Investment Income

 The interest received year to date is over the YTD budget because interest rates have increased. This was budgeted at 2% and the current interest rate is 5.52% for LGIP and 1.08% for Wells Fargo.

#### Administrative Services Organization

 ASO Funding revenue is over budget due to the quicker than expected pace at which services have been provided this fiscal year (more than 50% of total funds budgeted have been spent and billed to date).

#### Other Community Partner Funding

 Funding budgeted to be received to date has been received; additional funding is budgeted to be received later in the year.

#### Miscellaneous Income

 This line is under budget due to timing of receiving matching funds from the insurance company, as well as 1.5% cash back from the CBHC credit card.

#### Program Expenditures

- Continuation Grants are under budget because certain providers are not current on invoicing the Children's Board (Florida State University, Hillsborough Community College, Rebuilding Together Tampa Bay, Boys & Girls Clubs of Tampa Bay, University of South Florida, Lutheran Services Florida). Also, a significant portion of new program funding has yet to be allocated.
- o Leveraged Investments are over budget.

#### Employee Salaries and Benefits

This line is slightly under budget due to four positions being vacant at various points during the year.

#### Contracted Professional Services

This line item is under budget due to the architectural services that will be obtained regarding the planned build out of the recently purchased property for an additional CBHC Family Resource Center in Brandon; the build out is expected to begin in the coming months. Additionally, planned Public Relations spending on various creative services has yet to occur. Community Education & Awareness spending is also under budget.

#### • CBHC FRC Occupancy Expenditures

 This line item is slightly under budget due to the timing of spending, primarily in building repairs/maintenance and utility services.

#### Facility Expenditures

This line item is under budget due to the timing of spending. Building repairs/maintenance, electric service, and water/sewer utility service are under budget but are expected to return to budgeted levels during the spring and summer months.

#### • Other Operating

 This line item is over budget due to the timing of making various insurance payments, purchasing office furniture and computer supplies, and renewing various large memberships/dues earlier in the year.

#### Capital Expenditures

o This line item is under budget due to the aforementioned planned build out of the property purchased.

#### Mandatory Government Fees

This line item is slightly under budget due to the timing of paying the property appraiser's fees, but this is expected to return to budgeted levels in the coming months.

### **Preserve Vision Florida**

#### Children's Vision Health and Safety Services



Every month, Preserve Vision Florida (PVF) provides vision services to each of the seven Children's Board Family Resource Centers. We often encounter families who may reside near one of the resource centers but lack proximity to the eye doctor partnering with us to deliver services. For some families, transportation poses a challenge.

Recently, we screened seven-year-old Marisleydi at CBFRC-Central. Her screening indicated a need for further evaluation by an optometrist. However, the Optical Outlets location proved somewhat distant for Marisleydi and her mother.

To address this challenge, the Children's Board allocates funding for PVF to utilize Uber Health. This enables us to bridge the transportation gap for our clients, ensuring access to quality services despite limited personal transportation.

For Marisleydi's family, we arranged transportation through Uber Health to facilitate their attendance at an eye exam at Optical Outlets in Brandon. A week later, her glasses were ready, prompting another trip to Optical Outlets for pick-up and adjustments. Marisleydi's mother expresses deep gratitude for our services and the opportunity for Marisleydi to envision her bright future.

PVF is committed to enhancing appointment attendance by enhancing service accessibility, from scheduling appointments to arranging transportation via Uber Health. Recognizing and addressing such barriers is crucial for effecting tangible change in the communities we serve. Our strategic resource utilization and unwavering dedication to our mission garnered significant recognition last year. The Tampa Bay Business Journal honored PVF as a One Tampa Bay Honoree, placing us among only 50 nonprofits and companies to receive this distinction.

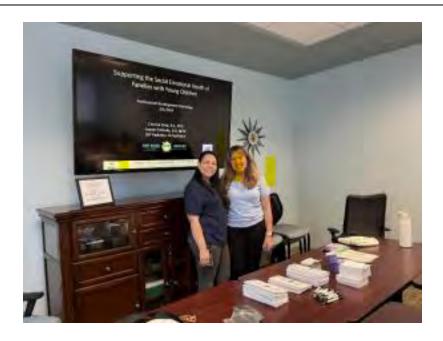
