#### **Recommended Action**

 Authorize Executive Director to enter into a purchase agreement with The Garland Company, Inc., for roof replacement using the Omnia Partners Cooperative Purchasing Contract for up to \$163,200 for the Children's Board Family Resource Center in Plant City located at 301 N. Palmer St., Plant City FL 33563, and up to \$74,400 for the Doretha Wynn Edgecomb Children's Board Family Resource Center in Temple Terrace located at 5892 E. Fowler Ave, Temple Terrace, FL 33617.

#### **Background - Update**

- October 17, 2023, the Children's Board received the final report from Design Styles
   Architecture, the vendor chosen to lead a project commissioned by the Children's
   Board to provide a building assessment of the condition of the Children's Board
   properties in Ybor City, Temple Terrace, and Plant City. The report provided a ten-year
   projection of capital projects to ensure the Children's Board properties would receive
   necessary maintenance and repairs to preserve their value. This report indicated that
   there were two roofs, Temple Terrace and Plant City, that are in need of replacement.
- The Children's Board procurement procedures allow using purchasing agreements such as Omnia Partners, which have been procured pursuant to competitive negotiations, and are in compliance with general law, as the vendor was procured by a process that would have met the procurement requirements of the Children's Board.
- Two companies, The Garland Company, Inc., and Tremco, both authorized vendors on the Omnia Partner's Competitive Purchasing Contract provided the Children's Board quotes for the roof replacement.
- The Garland Company provided lower quotes for both locations, therefore, the staff is recommending the contract be awarded to The Garland Company.
- Due to the nature of roof replacements and the unpredictability of issues that may not have reasonably been anticipated prior to the work commencing, the recommended up to amounts include a 20% contingency.

The service provider(s) would collaborate with community-based providers which specialize in mental/emotional health, systems navigation, and fatherhood engagement, as well as employers, workforce agencies and education institutions.

Two (2) proposals were received and one (1) proceeded to the Community Review Team. On May 14, 2024, CBHC Programs Procurement Manager, Shabel Santiago, facilitated the Community Review Team meeting. Community Review Team members included: Natasha Pierre – Mental Health Educator, Mindset Coach, Author; Natalia Melo – Community Relations Coordinator, Tampa Bay Federal Credit Union; and Rhonda Billups – Community member

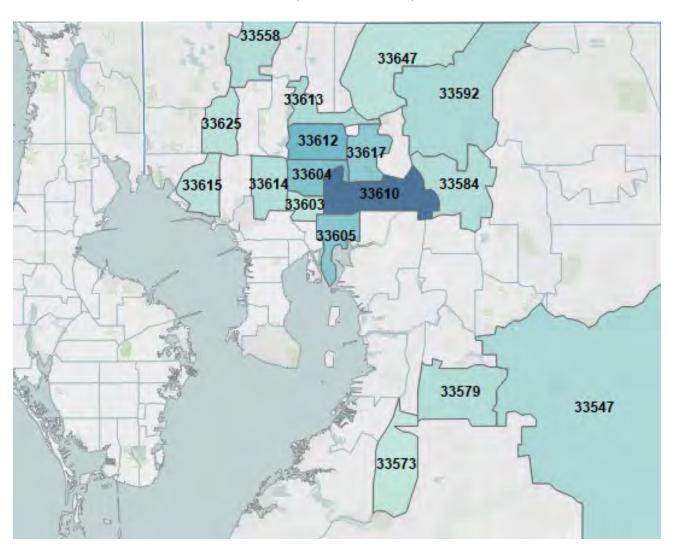

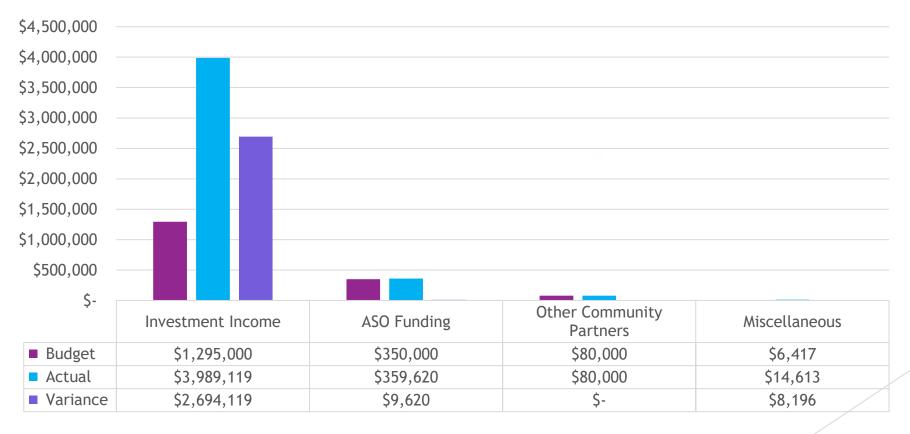

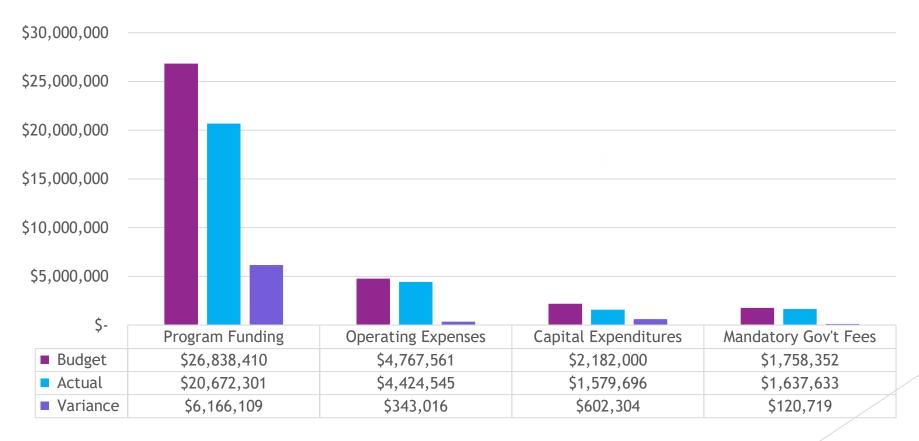

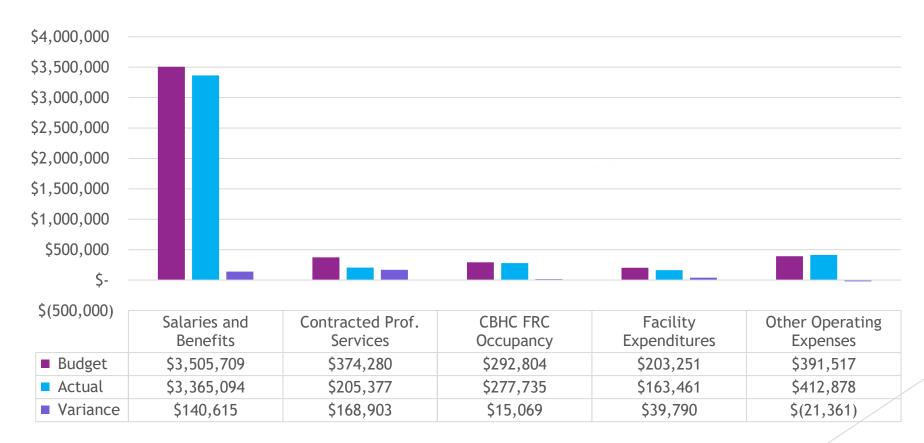

#### Financial Statement Category Definitions

#### Revenue

- **Ad-Valorem Taxes** includes current and delinquent ad-valorem tax revenue and excess fees returned to the Children's Board originally paid to the County based on the tax revenue.
- Investment Income includes revenue from various interest-bearing accounts.
- Administrative Services Organization (ASO) funding represents contributions from other funders specifically designated for use by providers in the community, managed by the Children's Board ASO staff. These dollars are also included in the program expenditure line. An example is the Hillsborough County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC).
- Other Community Partner funding represents funds contributed from community partners
  that are added to our provider contract amounts and included in the program funding line,
  for example, the School District of Hillsborough County and Hillsborough County BOCC.
- **Miscellaneous Income** consists of match revenue from the insurance company, cash back from the credit card, and any other miscellaneous revenue received during the year.

#### Expenditures

- Program Funding (Continuation Grants) represents provider contracts funded by Children's Board, property tax revenue and funds contributed from our community partners. This amount also includes the dollars managed through the ASO to provide support to participants of case management programs.
- New Program Funding (unallocated) includes dollars budgeted for new program contracts and one-time funding that will be released and awarded by a competitive or application process.
- Employee Salaries and Benefits include wages paid to all non-contractor employees.

  Benefits represent costs provided for salaried and hourly wage employees including Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA), life and health insurance, short-term and long-term disability insurance, unemployment, and retirement benefits.
- Contracted Professional Services represents amounts budgeted for contracted information technology services, legal, media buys, auditing, and other professional services.
- **Facility Expenditures** represents necessary costs to operate the Children's Board offices, conference center, and seven (7) CBHC Family Resource Centers (CB FRC) occupancy expenditures, including utilities, information technology, maintenance, and repairs.
- Other Operating contains staff training, conference and meeting travel, postage, insurance, promotional activities, printing, supplies, advertising for Truth In Millage (TRIM), budget ads and other public notices, memberships, and subscriptions. Also included are support activities with provider agencies and community organizations for training and events.
- Capital Expenditures include the budget for building expenditures.
- Mandatory Government Fees include Tax Collector's fee, Property Appraiser's fee as well
  as the City Storm Water fee.

#### Ad-Valorem Taxes

This line is over the YTD budget by \$2,306,566; 97% of the tax revenue budgeted has been received to date.

#### Investment Income

 The interest received year to date is over the YTD budget because interest rates have increased. This was budgeted at 2% and the current interest rate is 5.52% for LGIP and 1.08% for Wells Fargo.

#### Administrative Services Organization

 ASO Funding revenue is over budget due to the quicker than expected pace at which services have been provided this fiscal year (more than 50% of total funds budgeted have been spent and billed to date).

#### Other Community Partner Funding

 Funding budgeted to be received to date has been received; additional funding is budgeted to be received later in the year.

#### Miscellaneous Income

This line is over budget due to the receipt of rental revenue from the former owner of the recently purchased property for an additional CBHC Family Resource Center in Brandon. The space is currently being occupied by the former owner as part of a temporary leaseback arrangement made per the terms of the sale.

#### • Program Expenditures

- Continuation Grants are under budget because certain providers are not current on invoicing the Children's Board (Florida State University, Rebuilding Together Tampa Bay, St. Joseph's Hospital). Also, a significant portion of new program funding has yet to be allocated.
- Leveraged Investments are over budget.

#### Employee Salaries and Benefits

o This line is slightly under budget due to four positions being vacant at various points during the year.

#### Contracted Professional Services

This line item is under budget due to the architectural services that will be obtained regarding the planned build out of the recently purchased property for an additional CBHC Family Resource Center in Brandon; the build out is expected to begin in the coming months. Additionally, planned Public Relations spending on various creative services has yet to occur. Community Education & Awareness spending is also under budget.

#### • CBHC FRC Occupancy Expenditures

 This line item is slightly under budget due to the timing of spending, primarily in building repairs/maintenance, janitorial services, and utility services.

#### • Facility Expenditures

This line item is under budget due to the timing of spending. Building repairs/maintenance, electric service, and water/sewer utility service are under budget but are expected to return to budgeted levels during the spring and summer months.

#### Other Operating

This line item is over budget due to the timing of making various insurance payments, purchasing office furniture and computer supplies, and renewing various large memberships/dues earlier in the year.

#### Capital Expenditures

This line item is under budget due to the aforementioned planned build out of the property purchased.

#### Mandatory Government Fees

This line item is slightly under budget due to the timing of paying the property appraiser's fees, but this is
expected to return to budgeted levels in the coming months.

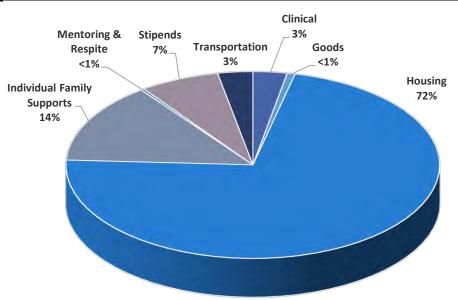

Students engaged in exercises that challenged them to complete sentences with "is" or "are," arrange words to form questions, and respond with complete questions based on given answers. The interactive nature of the class fostered understanding and mastery of this essential linguistic concept.

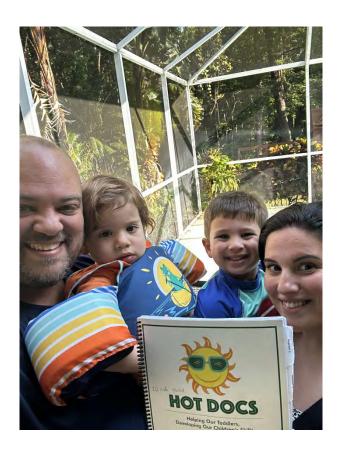

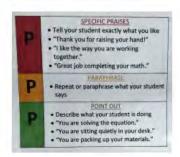

**Trauma-Informed Schools: Tiered Interventions** 

Over the month of March, the Trauma-Informed Schools (TIS) team and Giunta Middle School celebrated school personnel who have completed the Child-Adult Relationship Enhancement (CARE) in the Classroom training, as well as additional coaching sessions. CARE is a trauma-informed intervention that can be used by adults working with children with trauma, helping to improve attachment and relationships through positive attention, clear directions, and effective communication skills. Our TIS team has worked closely with the Giunta faculty and staff to provide in-classroom teacher coaching with the goal of supporting positive student-teacher relationships and interactions, and addressing classroom disruptive behaviors.

Giunta Middle School has also selected 10 school staff who have received additional training to become CARE coaches to expand coaching opportunities. By the end of March, all 6th and 7th grade teachers, student support services staff, and the administrative team had completed their CARE in the classroom training and additional coaching sessions. The TIS team celebrated the success of these faculty and staff with donuts and gift cards.

The TIS team is excited about the progress at Giunta Middle School and looks forward to completing CARE coach sessions with the remaining faculty/staff before year-end, and also celebrating them with donuts and gift cards!
